
ALLERGEN MANAGEMENT

Food allergies can be deadly.

These nine allergens require labeling and control:



Symptoms of an allergic reaction may include **itching**, **swelling**, **throat irritation**, **hives**, **trouble breathing** and **cardiac arrest**. Allergens can be listed by different names but should be labeled on packaging. Some common ingredients may contain hidden allergens. For example, mayonnaise may contain soy or eggs, and pesto may contain tree nuts.

Keep food allergens away from non-allergen foods.



Label

Label all allergens in storage. Store them away from non-allergen foods.



Wash hands, utensils and surfaces when switching from allergen to non-allergen foods.



Let customers and staff know about possible allergen risks. Tell cooks about customers' allergies.



Call 911 at the first sign of a reaction.

The permit holder shall notify consumers by written notification of the presence of major food allergens as an ingredient in unpackaged food items that are served or sold to the consumer. <u>3-602.12 FDA Food Code</u>

Written notification can be provided in many forms such as: physical or electronic means, including, but not limited to, brochures, deli case or menu notifications, label statements, table tents, or placards. <u>Annex 3-144 FDA Food Code</u>
